Michigan State University was founded in 1855 as the nation's first land-grant university. MSU's campus is bordered by the city of East Lansing and traversed by the Red Cedar River. This park-like setting provides an ideal venue in which MSU's 41,000 students enjoy various activities. The College of Veterinary Medicine is a national leader in state-of-the-art technology and facilities and has one of the largest caseloads in the country.

CURRICULUM: The four-year curriculum for students in the professional DVM program consists of four phases. Phase I covers two semesters with 39 credits and focuses on normality. Phase II covers two semesters with 43 credits and focuses on abnormality. Phase III covers one semester with 21 credits and emphasizes intervention and prevention. Phase IV covers four semesters with 60 credits that focus on clinical and applied veterinary medical sciences. Half (30 credits) of these experiences are required core clinical clerkships and half (30 credits) are elective experiences.

ADMISSION PROCESS: All applications are submitted through the Veterinary Medical College Application Service (VMCAS). Admissions decisions are arrived at in a formula-based process that evaluates applicants on academic performance factors and nonacademic factors including an interview. Interviews are a required part of the process and are conducted in January, February, and March for invited applicants only. No candidate is admitted without an interview. Three completed VMCAS evaluations are required in the MSU process. One of the required evaluations must be from a veterinarian. Acceptance of an offer of admission is due no later than April 15. SIZE OF ENTERING CLASS: 104

DEADLINE DATE: The VMCAS application must be postmarked no later than October 1. We encourage applicants to submit their applications early or before October 1 to expedite processing.

CLASSES BEGIN: late August

SUPPLEMENTAL PROCESSING FEE: The College of Veterinary Medicine requires a supplemental fee. You will be contacted by the college once your application is received and reviewed. Applicants who appear competitive will receive a supplementary application and will be required to submit a supplementary fee with the application at that time. Supplementary applications are usually distributed to selected applicants in December.

ADMISSION DEPOSIT: A deposit of \$250 for Michigan residents and \$500 for nonresidents is required to hold a position in the class and will be credited toward tuition and fees at matriculation.

TUITION AND FEES: 2002-2003 \$11,832 resident; \$24,432 nonresident (subject to change in 2002-2003)

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS: Priority is given to Michigan residents. Admission of non resident and international applicants is limited. Either the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) General Test or the Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) is required and should be taken no later than October 1, 2002. A Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) is required for applicants whose primary language is not English. Test scores older than five years are not acceptable.
