 - Is the debt so crushing as to discourage applicants and/or dramatically influence career path?





Total Number of DVM Students in US Colleges of Veterinary Medicine




US Veterinary School Applicant Pool

Predicted Shifts



At Large Assumptions:

- American students who have sought international CVM opportunities will shift & choose domestic institutions.
- Estimated 10% of the applicant pool.
- As applicants apply to an average 3.9 CVMs, not sure how many of these applicants are already in the pool or will opt to stay in the US.
- Ross and St. George's also need to figure in predictions because their accreditation has provided applicants with other barrier free options.
- The ratio is still falling modestly.
- Seats are increasing domestically and internationally.





1st Year Student Pre-Vet GPA



1st Year DVM Student GPA Distribution



1st Year DVM Student Verbal GRE Score Distribution



1st Year DVM Student Quantitative GRE Score Distribution



2000 - 2010






Synopsis

So what's coming in the future?





Well...



- Prediction hasn't changed.
- Enrollment is growing faster than the applicant pool.
- The pressure on the pool will increase.
- If the pool stays stable with the same rate of growth, applicant pools will likely have more work to do in the qualitative assessment of applicants.
- Recruitment efforts nationally and locally are essential.
