Dear Secretary Cardona,

I am writing to request information about the implementation of the rules on institutional and programmatic accountability finalized by the Department of Education (the Department) last fall. Specifically, we have concerns about the metrics that the Department will use to determine what constitutes a "failing program" under the new Gainful Employment regulations. According to the Department's press release, programs would have to show that:

- Graduates can afford their yearly debt payments. In particular, the share of their annual
 earnings needed to devote to paying their debt (i.e., their "debt-to-earnings ratio") must
 be equal to or less than 8 percent, or equal to or less than 20 percent of their
 discretionary earnings (i.e., their annual earnings above 150 percent of the Federal
 poverty guideline).
- At least half of graduates have higher earnings than a typical high school graduate in their state's labor force who never pursued a postsecondary education.

We would like additional information on exactly how the Department plans to gather and analyze this data. Who will be collecting this information and from what sources? Our member institutions believe that they provide an excellent educational foundation for our graduates, preparing them for a career in veterinary medicine. As such, we do not wish to see programs characterized unfairly.
